Purpose and Teaching Objectives

ENY 5006 is a combined course with ENY 3005. This course provides a framework for understanding the world of insects, their evolutionary history, ecological significance and conservation, and ways in which they come into conflict with humans. The graduate student project will allow advanced training in entomological research, beyond what is expected for undergraduate students.

Overall course objectives

- 1) Increased awareness and understanding of the natural world.
- 2) Ability to explain how insects function internally and externally.
- 3) Knowledge of the insect orders and some important families.
- 4) Recognition of the ecological and evolutionary importance of insects.
- 5) Appreciation for applied topics in entomology including medical & veterinary entomology, insect pest management, and insect conservation perspectives.
- 6) Ability to analyze the primary scientific literature and then make it understandable to your peers.

Textbook (recommended, not required): Daly and Doyen's Introduction to Insect Biology and Diversity by Whitfield and Purcell, 4th Edition. I also recommend checking out Insects: Evolutionary Success, Unrivaled Diversity, and World Domination, by David B. Rivers (published 2017).
 Video: Students are expected to watch the Life in the Undergrowth series, which is described here: http://www.bbc.co.uk/sn/tvradio/programmes/lifeintheundergrowth/. Students are responsible for viewing these videos outside of class time. The videos can be rented through Amazon Prime Video and may be available elsewhere online.
